

TOWN TOUR KICK-OFF AND TOURS A LEGACY TO REMEMBER: IRON AND METHODISM

Enjoy the festivities as we kick off the 22nd Annual Town Tours and Village Walks at the WC United Methodist Church starting at 5:30 pm. After the

program, you and your tour guide will explore the Southeast quadrant of West Chester Borough. This sector of the Borough includes an impressive part of the downtown, distinguished churches and other historic buildings, and handsome residential streets. Each individual group tour is a specially designed and written tour with its own focus and itinerary. The decorative use of iron will be featured as well as other links to the iron industry.

(2) JUNE 16 WHERE IT BEGAN: **COVENTRYVILLE & COVENTRY FORGE**



SPONSORS: South Coventry Township Historical Review Board & Commission & Warwick County Park

Coventryville was founded in 1717 by Samuel Nutt along the banks of French Creek. With the swiftly flowing creek and available supply of hardwood

forests, Coventryville was the site of Coventry Forge, the first iron forge in Chester County. As the industry grew, the village flourished in the 18th and 19th centuries. Today, Coventryville remains a lovely residential neighborhood with many historic stories to tell. Be sure to find out why Benjamin Franklin frequented the village and where one of the first Franklin stoves was installed!

PARKING & INFORMATION: Program begins at 6 pm, last bus leaves the village at 7:30 pm. Parking at Warwick County Park, 382 County Park Road, Pottstown. Meet Lady Rebecca Grace and collier David Stephens who will introduce you to 18th and 19th century Chester County and guide you to your bus, taking you to the 1/2 mile walk through the village.

(3) JUNE 23 WARWICK VILLAGE: A STEP BACK IN TIME



SPONSOR: Warwick Township & Historical Commission

Warwick, once known as St. Mary's, has been a village in northern Chester County since 1717, when settlers arrived to work the local iron ore mines. Eighteenth and nineteenth century houses line both sides of the

narrow road that ambles through the village. Typical of the times, many of the houses served as more than residences; they became general stores, a seed shop, blacksmith shop, a parsonage, a tavern, a funeral parlor and a school. St. Mary's Episcopal Church, in the center of the village, was founded by Levi Bull in 1805. It is believed to be the first church built in PA after the American Revolution.

(4) JUNE 30

PHOENIX IRON TOUR: FROM NAILS, TO RAILS AND CANNONS TO COLUMNS



SPONSOR: Schuylkill River Heritage Center & Historical Society of the Phoenixville Area In 1790, Benjamin Longstreth established the French Creek Nail Works, which was the first nail factory in the United States. By 1824, it was

the largest nail works in the country. The village later became the Borough of Phoenixville in 1849. Over its 200 years until it closed in 1987, the company told the story of America's industrial growth based on iron and steel production. Phoenix Iron Works grew from a small nail factory into Phoenix Iron Co., Phoenix Iron and Steel Co., and eventually Phoenix Steel. Join our stroll around the area where the company was once located. Cross the Gay Street Bridge and enjoy the view of the former iron and steel property and learn about its importance to our county's iron and steel heritage. Enjoy refreshments in the Schuykill River Heritage Center Sculpture Garden.

Celebrate the life and times of Rebecca Lukens, America's first female industrialist, and her descendants. Although by far not the only woman who managed iron furnaces in the 19th century, Rebecca was the only

documented woman to manage multiple businesses. The list of National Historic Landmark properties along South First Avenue include her home, Brandywine Mansion, Terracina, and the steel industry that evolved from the original iron business. The proximity of these homes and offices to the mill reflects the Lukens and Huston families' long-standing commitment to living and working close to the factory and the community. Learn about the owners of the mills and the men and women who worked in them.

SPONSOR: Historic Yellow Springs Hop on our trolley and celebrate 300 years of iron and steel in Chester County touring sites that supplied products to aid the fight for freedom in the founding of our country. The Yellow Springs Revolutionary War Hospital supplied medicine and care

for the Continental Army; the Woolen Mill at Charlestown Village produced cloth to dress soldiers and civilians; the Continental Powder Works in Kimberton produced gunpowder; the Anselma Mill in Chester Springs produced flour to feed the growing population and the army. Visit these sites as well as learn about the churches, cemeteries, barns, mills, schools, covered bridges and iron mine sites along our scenic Chester County byways.

(7) JULY 21

HISTORIC SUGARTOWN: 19TH CENTURY CHESTER COUNTY



SPONSOR: Historic Sugartown, Inc. Originally known as "Shugart's Town" after tavern proprietor Eli Shugart, Sugartown became a vital stop for

weary travelers as they hauled wagonloads of freight and raw materials to market during the 1800s. Today, Historic Sugartown's visitors discover 19th-century village life through the c. 1880 General Store,

the c. 1805 William Garrett House, the Carriage Museum, and Book Bindery. Enjoy a tour of the village as well as paper marbling demonstrations by Master Bookbinder Ramon Townsend

(8) JULY 28

HIBERNIA MANSION AND IRON MASTER PLANTATION



SPONSOR: Chester County Facilities and Parks & Friends of Hibernia Mansion

In the summer of 1861, Henry Clay Brooke, son to Ironmaster Charles Brooke, enlisted to fight in the Civil War. His father, Charles Brooke, had managed a successful iron plantation

at Hibernia since 1821 but was now in poor health. Within twenty years, falling victim to the Depression of 1873 among other factors, the once thriving Hibernia Iron Works was silent and virtually abandoned. Purchased in 1894 by wealthy Philadelphian Franklin Swayne, the property was redesigned to emulate an English country house and once again prospered. Join us as we explore the legacies of the mansion builders Charles Brooks and "Colonel" Franklin Swayne and the evolution of the 19th century iron plantation to a country home and now county park. Both the fully furnished mansion and ruins of the ironworks will be toured.

(9) AUGUST 4 JOANNA FURNACE: AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL TRIUMPH



SPONSOR: Hay Creek Valley Association

Meet the living history interpreters of this remarkably restored iron village. Nestled in an area rich with iron ore, abundant woodland for charcoal, limestone, and waterways to provide power, lies Joanna Furnace - a

historic remnant of Berks County's thriving early iron industry. Unlike today's corporations with their large buildings and complex hierarchies, the 19th century iron industry at Joanna Furnace was the product of rugged individualism. From the semi-wilderness of Robeson Township in 1791, Joanna Furnace was started by Samuel Potts, Thomas Rutter III, Thomas May and Thomas Bull. The furnace was named in honor of Pott's wife, Joanna Holland Potts, and was a cold blast, single stack, charcoal iron furnace most of her life. The furnace blew out in 1898, and for the next eighty years was hidden by vines and forgotten. Come see the rebirth of Historic Joanna Furnace

(10) AUGUST 11 CARVER COURT: A LIVING LEGACY



SPONSOR: Caln Historical Commission, Caln Historical Society, & Friends of Carver Court

Three giants of modern architecture in Philadelphia, George Howe, Louis I. Kahn, and Oskar Stonorov collaborated on this Federal housing project built for African American defense workers

and their families just outside of Coatesville during World War II. The former Hatfield family farm was converted into a landscaped cul-de-sac encircling a common green space, lined with 100 units of one and two story international style homes. Join residents, past and present, to learn about this special community's story of challenge and triumph; where state of the art design, steel production, and race relations all tell a uniquely American story.

(11) AUGUST 18 MID-CENTURY MODERN IN MIDDLE PICKERING



SPONSORS: East Pikeland Historical Commission, & Pikeland Historical Society

The Middle Pickering National Register Historic District along Pickering Creek is home to buildings and people who define the transformation of early industry in

Chester County to the towering urban achievements of mid 20th century Philadelphia. The village of Merlin was an important crossroads for industry and agriculture in the 18th and 19th centuries. Oscar Stonorov architect, and Ed Bacon, planner, made their homes in this area 50 years later, bringing progressive modernism with them. The tour begins in the Stonorov residence with the history of the family in architecture and education then follows the creek back in time to end at the Merlin crossroads.

(12) AUGUST 25 & 27 300 YEARS OF IRON AND STEEL 100 YEARS OF NATIONAL PARK SERVICE



SPONSOR: Hopewell Furnace National Historic Site

In 1716, Rutter's Bloomery, later named Pine Forge, was the first iron orge in Pennsylvania. Hopewell Furnace was established in 1770 Come celebrate 300 years of iron heritage at our National Park dedicated to the history of iron production in the mid-Atlantic, and

help us commemorate the 100th Anniversary celebration of the founding of the National Park Service.
